I trust everyone has a great fortnight.



It provides an opportunity for parents, students and teachers to all be focussed on the student's learning.

#### Behaviour

As I walk around the junior school it is good to see the majority of children in the playground and classroom following our school rules and playing and learning in a safe manner. However we still have a few students in Prep and Year 1 who are having difficulty with managing their behaviour. Our teachers have behaviour lessons each week where they talk to the class about behaviour expectations at Bounty. If students are referred to the Reflection Room, the teacher will talk to the student about the behaviour they have chosen and what they could do differently next time. I regularly have conversations with parents when students make inappropriate choices.

We do appreciate it when as parents you can have a similar conversation with your child and reinforce the expectations articulated in our Responsible Behaviour Plan for Students.

I seem to have been out of school several days over the last 2 weeks attending various professional development sessions. One of the interesting sessions I attended was on Functional Behaviour, which basically explores the behaviour exhibited, what triggered that behaviour and what the outcomes the behaviours are seeking to achieve. It is important to establish the reasons students are making inappropriate behaviour choices so we can help them achieve the desired outcome in a different way. For example, a student may make an inappropriate gesture in order to get another student's attention. Once we know what the student is trying to achieve, we can help the student to go about things in a more appropriate way to achieve the same outcome.

#### Music & Drama

Thank you to all of our drama and music teachers for the work you put in at Bounty to support our Drama and Music program. The final performance of these events is testimony to the number of practice sessions and hard work that goes on behind the scenes. Following a very successful drama production led by Katy; The Bounty Voices, The Bounty Blokes and the Allegro Strings successfully performed a number of musical items at The Pine Rivers Show. Thank you to Katy, Sheylene and Melissa for the preparation that went into these musical numbers.

It has been an extremely fast start to Term 3. People often comment to me saying that Term 3 is where there isn't a lot that happens. To the contrary of this, I find that Term 3 is the busiest.



Next week provides parents and carers an excellent opportunity to set the compass for the remainder of the year. The bi-annual goal-setting sessions allow for parents, teacher and student the opportunity to set achievable goals for the remainder of the year. By setting these goals, parents and carers have the opportunity to discuss learning priorities with their child as they are the most pivotal element within the conversation. The children have to own the goals and have 'buy-in' so that they are able to take ownership of their own learning journey. In the last couple of days I have been attending the Pine Rivers District Athletics Carnival. With close to 50 students representing our school it was my pleasure in managing these students. ## Wellbeing at Bounty Boulevard

**This week's wellbeing information is about anxiety.** How do you notice anxiety in children?

*At home*

- Fear and avoidance of a range of issues and situations.
- Headaches and stomach aches that seem to occur when the child has to do something that is unfamiliar or that they feel uneasy about.
- **Sleep difficulties, including difficulty falling asleep**, nightmares and trouble sleeping alone.
- Lots of worries and a strong need for reassurance.

*At school*

- Wanting things to be perfect. For example, a child **may be so dissatisfied with his/her own work that** he/she will tear it up and redo it several times.
- Reluctance to ask for help. Sometimes anxiety creates an obstacle that prevents children asking for help from the teacher about a problem with learning.
- Children who ask too much for reassurance may also be overly anxious.
- **Difficulty joining in.** Children with high levels of anxiety may be afraid to join in class discussion, take part in sport or games or go to school camp.
- Requests to go to sick bay. Anxious children often complain of stomach aches and headaches.
- Fearful of test situations. Some children do not do as well as they can in test conditions because they are struggling with anxiety. They may also be too self-conscious to perform in front of the class.

## How to assist children with anxiety problems

Children with anxiety difficulties are often quiet and obedient. This can lead to their difficulties being overlooked. It is important to take note of children's worries so that their difficulties can be addressed sooner rather than later.

## General principles for assisting children with anxiety disorders

**Increase children's helpful coping skills**

Anxious feelings are fed by anxious thinking. It is **important not to dismiss children's anxious feelings, but** to help children see that the situations they are worried about may not be as bad as they think.

## Teach by example

Showing children how you cope positively with feeling anxious or stressed and remaining calm and positive when they are feeling anxious can help them to feel **more confident**.

## Avoid taking over

Children with anxiety are usually very happy for someone else to do things for them. However, if adults take over, it stops children from learning how to cope themselves.

**Encourage children to 'have a go'**

Having a go helps to show children that they can cope. Praise or reward them for every step they manage to take.

The dome acts as a screen to project the night sky which students then observe under the guidance of the Starlab presenter.






