Dear Parents & Students,

## Hall Construction

I am pleased to inform you that the State Government on the 22<sup>nd</sup> March announced a grant for capital works of \$5 million for a hall at Bounty Boulevard State School. As the largest primary school in Queensland we really welcome this announcement by the Honourable Minister for Education Ms Kate Jones. There has been a number of people instrumental in lobbying for this hall in particular Mr Chris Whiting local member for Murrumba, our school P&C and school council, staff, parents and students who united to assist in making this capital project a reality.



This hall will be a welcome addition to teaching and learning here at Bounty. My understanding is the hall will have a multi-purpose court and a stage for our Performing Arts. We will be able to hold whole school assemblies which cultivate public speaking with our school leaders. In the past we have hired halls for school performances and professional development as we have 145 on staff and 1340 children P – 6. We will now be able to host these events on our campus. This venue will also provide shade and alternate class area for our HPE classes during inclement weather. Currently our school runs a variety of lunchtime clubs and we will incorporate the facility into this rotation model. Outside School Hours Care is a service provided for our children who will be able to utilise this facility to augment this service along with vacation care for our school community. The school executive team, P&C and school council will collaborate on a business plan with the school community who may wish to access this facility.

The timeline for completion of this facility is late 2017 as informed by Infrastructure and Design Central office. This capital works is a high priority project. I am looking forward to the opening of this building for our whole school community to access. There will be a display with the hall plans in the foyer in Term 2.

## Staffing Changes

**It is time to farewell Mr Mark Wrigley who has been promoted to Principal Band 8 at Queen's Beach State School, Bowen. Mark has been a very valued member of our staff. I'd like to thank him for his strong contribution to our school over the last 2 years and he will be sorely missed. I wish him well for his further career. Mark commences service in Bowen effective Term 2.**

The two new permanent Deputy Principals have been recruited and were appointed from Central office late Friday afternoon. Congratulations to Kerri McGrath and Crystal Kirkwood. They will commence in a permanent capacity on the 18<sup>th</sup> April. Both ladies have been Deputy Principals in smaller school – welcome to our staff.

Students are now getting excited about the Easter Bonnet parade next Friday. They have been busy making wonderful creations in class and during their music lessons have been practising the song they are going to perform for you. I know teachers **have been very appreciative of the items parents have sent in to decorate the students' bonnets. The Prep Easter Bonnet parade begins at 9:30am. The students will march from the Prep precinct to the middle year's undercover area next to the café.**



Thank you for the support you have given our Prep teachers this term. You will have noticed how quickly the students have adjusted to school life. In Prep this term we have concentrated on consolidating phonemic awareness in preparation for learning sight words and beginning to read and write next term. Preppies have also participated in many different fine and gross motor activities to build muscle tone and improve manual dexterity.

Homework has been about reinforcing the letter sounds and names. This basic phonemic awareness is such an important building block for **students' readiness for reading i.e. listening to, and sounding out letters. Although the format of the homework may look different from class to class, all Prep classes are following the same Homework program.**

**All Prep teachers came off line last week to plan for next term's work. Planning together ensures we have consistency across all classes for all subject areas and teacher expectations of student learning outcomes are the same.**

ABC Reading Eggs is a reading app Bounty subscribes to. It costs you nothing. I encourage you to use this with your children. They love it and it fosters interest in reading.

### The ARTS

Thank you Susan Liyanage for supporting our strings students this term. From Term 2 the new appointed Strings teacher will be George Stylianou. George comes highly recommended from the Metropolitan Region.

### PBL - Positive Behaviour for Learning

This week two students from every class will be celebrating their Bounty Gold successes. Preps, Yr 1 & 2 students will be watching a movie during class time. The upper school will be going to Aurora Park and enjoying activities during the middle session.

Many PBL members have been attending PD throughout the region and feeding back to the committee so we can be across the latest behaviour data and initiatives that support our Positive Behaviour for Learning system. Our own data reflects that students are listening to, and responding to the behaviours lessons every class runs on one day during the week.

We will shortly have the PBL regional coach, Judy Loudon assessing our behaviour practices throughout the school. She will feed back to the committee her findings after speaking with team members, Mr McSwiney, students chosen at random and teachers, also chosen at random. Her findings will inform our 2017 PBL Action Plan.

## DEPUTY PRINCIPAL (YEAR 1 & YEAR 2)

WOW! It is very difficult to believe that it is the end of term 1 already! I have thoroughly loved my first term at Bounty and have met so many wonderful, children, families and staff. Something that makes Bounty special is the way in which new people are **welcomed into the school and it certainly doesn't take long to establish strong relationships with all those involved in our great school.**



Over the last two weeks I have been visiting classrooms to observe teachers and children during guided reading sessions. It is wonderful to see how settled our classes are and how smoothly they transition from one activity to the next. I have been impressed by the quality of teaching that is occurring in our classrooms and how the teachers have identified where students are at and what they need to do in order to improve their understanding. Reading is our number 1 priority on our Annual Implementation Plan and is a major focus for our observation and feedback cycle with staff.

We all recognise the importance of home/school relationships and ask that you support us by making daily reading an important part of your home life also. It has been proven that children who read every day or are read to everyday will have greater academic success later in life. We live in a very busy world and if finding time to listen to your children read is difficult how about getting them to read to you while you are preparing dinner each night – it will certainly make cooking dinner more entertaining!

### Did you know?

If a child reads for 20 minutes every day, they are exposed to about 1.8 million words of text every year. That is 137 new words per minute! If families read together for 20 minutes a day, 7 days a week, they get more than 121 hours of bonding time every year!

### School Disco

On Friday night I had the pleasure of attending our school disco – what a great night it was! The support from families was amazing and it was great to see so many children on the dance floor. I want to make a special shout out to our helpers on the night many of whom were at school late on Wednesday night for our P&C meeting also. Without the merry band of volunteers and staff assisting at these events they would not be successful. I loved seeing the teachers in my sector on the dance floor dancing with the children, you could see they were enjoying it and it meant the world to our children who attended. So thank you to all those who made themselves available to attend the night either as parents or as helpers.

Each week I try to add some information to my newsletter to assist with raising happy, healthy, confident children. This week I am sharing information on the age old question we ask our kids each day and the conversation goes something like this:

Parent: How was school today?

Child: Okay.....

**When given this response we as parents often panic and think that means they don't like school or didn't have a good day, when usually its more about the fact that they have had a big day and are tired and hungry and don't really want to talk about their day just yet.** We also want our children to enjoy school so putting a positive spin on the types of questions we ask them can assist with them having a positive attitude about school. Here are some questions to get the conversation about their day started:

What was fun at school today?

What did you like best at school today?

What did you do at lunch today and who with?

What subjects did you do today?

What are you learning about in science?

One of my favourite questions I ask each night at the dinner table is what mistakes did you make today? Then we all sit and discuss what mistakes we made today, this teaches children that it is ok to make mistakes and that we all make them. We then discuss what we learnt from that mistake to help us do something better next time.

Have a wonderful safe Easter break!

What a fabulous term of learning at BBSS for Years 3&4. Even through the wet weather last week, the children of Year 3 enjoyed their excursion to the Caboolture Historical Museum. The teachers have come back and told me that the children were behaved exceptionally. I would like to take this opportunity to thank the additional parents and carers who came along to the excursion to support the children and the teachers. It was great to have that level of engagement from the parents when travelling off site. The children absolutely loved learning about school in the old days and this was such a positive learning experience for the children.



Tomorrow, I will be meeting with parents from Year 4 as we start camp preparations for 2017. I would like to thank Mrs Tammy Crowley for starting the organisation process for Camp. This year, the Year 4 students will be travelling to Currimundi which is located up at Caloundra. This site is very well known and is actually run by the Department. The parent information sessions will be held in the Middle Years Undercover area at 3:15pm and 6:00pm on this Thursday. Parents and carers are invited to send back an expression of interest form so that we are able to gauge numbers. This is important as it allows us to provide parents with an accurate cost of the camp.

I would like to take this opportunity to speak about attendance of students at BBSS. This year, we have really started to tighten the process for students who are absent from school or who are late to school. If children are receiving a late slip in the morning without a parent accompanying them, this absence will be noted as an *unexplained* absence and parents and carers will receive a text message about this. I have had some parents query the text message. Therefore, I thought I would take some time to explain why this is the case.

We have had students at the school arrive at school late and provide reasons that they were late because:

- Mum was running late
- **Parents couldn't get a park**
- I slept in.

These are just a few examples. We have a duty of care at Bounty to notify parents if children are absent for roll marking or they are late. Unfortunately, some children have not been telling the truth about why they were late to school. Therefore, as an Administration team, the decision was made that unless a parent is accompanying the child, the absence will be recorded as *unexplained*. An unexplained absence will automatically trigger a text message to parents alerting them of this absence. If parents are unable to accompany their child into the office at drop-off time, this is perfectly ok. All this will do is trigger a text message which provides parents with an opportunity to then explain the absence which means it does not become an *unexplained* absence, rather, an *explained* absence.

**If parents and carers want to be proactive with their child's absence the best way to communicate this with the school is to text the school using the number 0429 398 844. You can even do this if your child is going to be late. Simply state your child's name and class. Then you can also say whether your child will be late, or, if they are going to be absent with a reason for the absence.**

Since we have started to send out text messages for students who have been late, this has increased the amount of text messages that have been generated from the school. On some days, we can send up to 80-90 text messages for unexplained absences (including lates). Our goal would be to halve the amount of text messages that are being generated. A reminder that supervised areas are provided for Prep—Year 2 in the Prep Undercover Area and in the Middle Years Undercover Area for Years 3-6.. Students from Years 3-6 who arrive after 8:40am are considered late and this is the same for Prep—Yr 2 students who arrive at class after 8:55am.

Finally, I wish you all a safe and Happy Easter and I am looking forward to another term of Learning, Love and Laughter.

## Resolving issues respectfully at school

### Information for parents and families

A key priority of state school staff, parents and families is to foster a safe and healthy learning environment for all Queensland students. As a parent of a school-aged child, there may be times when issues arise that affect your child, for example a playground incident with another child or issues within the classroom. How those issues are handled

can make a significant difference to the learning and development of our students, and the positive environments we aim to create and nurture. The following information can assist parents, families and school staff to manage issues respectfully and reach an outcome that is in the best interest of the student.

#### Talk to your child

Ask your child questions (who, what, where, when, how) to clarify the issue. This can give you an idea of whether your child is able to find their own solution to a problem, or if staff intervention is required. One of the skills children need to develop to operate in the world is to solve their own problems if they can, and adults play an important role in modelling how to do this effectively.

#### Talk to your child's teacher about academic or social issues

If you are concerned about your child's academic progress or school work, the teacher may be able to suggest ways to help your child at home or help you to access additional support at school. If your child is experiencing persistent social issues, make an appointment with your child's teacher as soon as possible. Together, you and your child's teacher should be able to resolve the issue calmly and respectfully.

#### Talk to your school office administration staff about general school issues

If you have a general issue — for example, having difficulty paying school fees or have concerns about a school staff member — you can get in touch with the school office administration staff to calmly discuss the issue and find a workable solution.

#### Talk to your school P&C association about services managed by the P&C

If you wish to discuss the services that are offered or managed by the P&C at your school, for example Outside of School Hours Care (OSHC) or the tuckshop, you should speak with the P&C executive in the first instance. #### Talk to your school principal or leadership team if the issue remains unresolved

If you have approached your child's teacher or school office staff and your issue remains unresolved, make an appointment to see the school principal to discuss the issue further.

#### Other useful tips for resolving issues related to school

- Remain calm and be respectful towards school staff when raising an issue with them.
- Try to keep an open mind and accept that multiple views reflect different perspectives.
- Remember schools are busy and complex places, and sometimes it may take time to resolve certain issues.
- Have a clear idea of the outcome you are seeking and communicate this desired result. If an agreed solution isn't working, discuss other options with school staff.

This Code of Conduct clarifies the expected standards of all P&C Association members. It has been adopted to aid all members of our school community to work as a cohesive group in partnership with the school.

The Code is intended to promote and maintain the highest standard of ethical behaviour by P&C Association members. Members of a P&C Association should adhere to the Code of Conduct at all times. This Code applies to each member of a P&C Association.

P&C Association members are to:

- act in the best interest of the total school community at all times
- conduct and present themselves in a professional manner and act ethically and with integrity at all times
- act with courtesy and demonstrate respect for all persons, whether fellow P&C Association members, school staff, parents/carers, students, community members
- remain objective and avoid personal bias at all times
- represent all members of the school community
- engage the school and wider community in developing and effecting school priorities, policies and decisions in a manner that is consultative, respectful and fair
- declare any conflicts of interest and not misuse their office to advance individual views or for personal gain
- make fair, transparent and consistent decisions
- provide objective and independent advice
- listen and be tolerant of the views and opinions of others, even if those views and opinions differ from their own
- treat official information with care and use it only for the purpose for which it was collected or authorised
- respect confidentiality and information privacy (about the school, community members, staff or students) at all times and not disclose confidential information
- not use confidential or privileged information to further personal interests
- be responsive to the requirements of the school community
- seek to achieve excellence in educational outcomes for all students at the school
- listen and respond to issues and concerns regarding strategy and policy
- work within the boundaries of the *Education (General Provisions) Act 2006*, the *Education (General Provisions) Regulation 2006* and the Department of Education and Training's policies and procedures relevant to P&C Association operations.
